What makes a good policy idea?



Simplicity

The impact can be understood by the public, (and media), easily communicated

Clarity

The purpose / objectives of the policy are clear

Impact

The policy leads to a clear benefit for society or the economy or group

Politics

It is politically feasible, ideally politically beneficial and popular

Delivery

It's realistic and deliverable

Credibility

The policy is built on robust evidence, drawing on research, data, and practice

Inspiring

Captures hearts and minds

2 rules, 4 key questions



<u>Rules</u>

- 1. Policy idea must be for the Westminster government or the government of a devolved nation
- 2. Policy ideas must have an impact on universities or students

4 key questions – use these as a template for your policy idea and pitch

- ➤ what is the policy **idea**?
- > what will be the **impact** on universities or students?
- > what will be the positive **benefit** to society or the economy?
- > why is it **politically feasible** or beneficial for government?
